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Why purple?

Purple is historically associated with efforts to achieve gender equality. In this context, it was first used alongside green and white as the colors of the Women's Social and Political Union. the organization that led Britain's women's suffrage movement in the early 20th century. For suffragettes fighting for the right to vote, purple represented "the royal blood that flows in the veins of every suffragette"... White represented purity and green represented hope. In the 1960s and 1970s, use of the color was revived by feminists to represent the Women's **Liberation movement** as a tribute to the suffragettes.

Women's History Month began as a local celebration in Santa Rosa, California. The Education Task Force of the Sonoma County (California) Commission on the Status of Women planned and executed a "Women's History Week" celebration in 1978. The organizers selected the week of March 8 to correspond with International Women's Day. The movement spread across the country as other communities initiated their own Women's History Week celebrations the following year.
